Almost done One year and \$8 million will give lunch a brand new look

I'm just really appreciative of all the staff and students that have been cooperating well with all the construction going on during school hours, all the fences that are put up, and with the whole lunch complications. It's really just been a pain," said Principal Sandy Torres.

Just ask any student if not having a cafeteria for a year is a "pain."

"It's annoying because the lines are long and sometimes it's really hot outside," said Rosalie Silva.

"I just hope that when the cafeteria is done there'll be more open tables because it can get really packed," said Adriana Gonzalez.

It's taken over 10 years to get this new cafeteria. In 2008, the voters

in the Colton School District passed Measure G a \$225 million school improvement bond. Six years ago the school got approved for a new cafeteria to be built from that money, and construction finally started last year. The new cafeteria is set to be finished by January.

The cafeteria is expected to hold 533 students at any one time. It will also have an updated indoor stage that also opens out into the outdoor quad area, a service line with digital menu displays, a teachers' lounge, a snack bar for students who want to grab something quick without going through the main cafeteria line. The cafeteria itself will have a large walkin fridge and freezer and a much larger kitchen with the ability for full prep cooking.

"Total cost for the cafeteria will be \$8,260,000," said Mr. Owen Chang, Director of Facilities and Con-

n Aug. 21, the United States experienced a solar eclipse....sort of.
Although it didn't get completely dark in California, we did see a 66% coverage of the sun, that is, if you had special eclipse sunglasses.

A solar eclipse is a rare natural phenomenon when the moon passes between the sun and earth and the moon partially or completely covers the sun. This can only happen when the sun and moon are in conjunction. In order to experience the full eclipse, you would have had to travel to Oregon, Idaho, western Kentucky, Tennessee and South Carolina.

The eclipse started at 9:05am in Oregon and ended at 2:48pm in South Carolina. Its longest duration was in Illinois where it was completely dark for 2 minutes and 40 seconds. The next total eclipse in North America is expected to be Oct. 2023.
