


# High School Culture EXPLAINED: Odd Shenanigans

TITAN TOWN - California (more specifically, Southern California), is known for its hot and dry Mediterranean weather. What is cold to Californians is nothing compared to the weather in some other states. Even our California winter, which consists of the occasional light rain and 55-degree mornings and nights, is no match for the heavy downpours, snow storms, and extreme weather in the South, Pacific Northwest, and East Coast. In that exact same way, the 80-degree and below summers in some other states can't quite compare to the summers in California, which can reach up to 120 degrees in the nearby Coachella Valley. Despite California's reputation as a hot and dry state, California tends to surprise its residents by switching it up, from time to time. "The weather is unpredictable. We're getting summer weather in spring," said Ms. Olga Aguila (Science).

The amount of rainfall this year differs noticeably from that of previous years. California had its driest weather in 2014-17 since 1895, with the most severe years being 2014 and 2015, according to credible news sources. During those four years. California lost 102 million trees due to the extreme weather. Most of those trees were lost in 2016. But, California received record rains and its extreme drought was put on pause in Winter of 2018, according to most weather experts.

If one were to look up "California weather 2018," countless articles and videos of forest fires would be the result. This is obviously the effect of the serious drought, which went on from Dec. 2011 to March 2017. While the drought has ended, California remains extremely dry compared to states that are more humid. One former GTHS student, who now lives in Florida, commented, "California is a dry heat, while Florida is an extremely wet heat. It also gets much colder and dryer in the winter."

In the Winter of 2018, California has experienced record days of rain, followed by hot and sunny days that made it appear as though the rain had never even happened. A Californian could look up at the snow covered mountains while standing on hot cement in the heat. It all depends on the location.

Climate and weather are not the same. When determining the climate of a state, meteorologists consider a state's high, low, and average weathers, precipitation, and severe weather cases. Weather is determined by heat, sunshine, wind, aridness, rain, etc. Weather defines how a certain location feels at a specific time, while climate defines how a specific place usually feels overall, on average. California's weather can appear to change on a day-to-day basis, from rainy to dry, windy to still, hot to chilly, etc. Despite the constant change in weather, California's climate remains popular, attracting many. #### LeBron James Fails to Take the Lakers to the **Finals**

LOS ANGELES - LeBron Raymone James Sr. is one of the most hyped athletes in the world and arguably the most popular franchise player in recent history. The Los Angeles Lakers acquired him last year, hoping to return the "Showtime" team to its glory days. But, due to the injures Lebron sustained, his first season with the Lakers is now over without competing in the playoffs.

LeBron played 55 games with an average of 27 points, 8 rebounds, 8 assists, according to statistics on ESPN. He hasn't missed a playoff game since the year 2004-2005.

"It is hard to sit back and watch the games go on without me. In the past eight years, I have been in the NBA Finals, and winning three championships. I really wanted this year with the Lakers to be a successful season," he said in an interview.

LeBron was the first round overall pick in 2003 by the Cleveland Cavaliers. He has the ideal size at 6'8", and his athleticism is so astonishing and his scoring statistics so high that he has become a four-time NBA MVP. Some would call him the "GOAT" (Greatest of All Time) or refer to him as "King James." One could argue that he has almost single-handedly carried his teams to championships. He has appeared in the Finals eight consecutive times. He has won three champion-

ships, one with Cleveland, his hometown, and one with Miami. LeBron was

picked for the NBA All-Star Game for the first time in 2005, and would soon go on to earn a spot in the annual showcase in each of

the next 14 seasons. And this vear, he was at the helm of the Los Angeles Lakers, who failed to make the finals.

Every team that

he has left is not necessarily the best without him.

"When LeBron leaves the Lakers they will be back to being very mediocre" said Junior Austin Roberts.

The last time the Lakers made the playoffs was in 2013, when they played the San Antonio Spurs. They played the first round and lost. This was before James was on the team. His team at the time, the Miami Heat, beat the Spurs in the Finals game and LeBron won the Finals MVP. This is a testament to why many fans say he makes a great impact on whatever team he is on.

LeBron has great potential to get the Lakers to the Finals or at least the playoffs, along with other players that they can acquire later on. "The Western Conference is the toughest competition because of the Golden State Warriors and the Houston Rockets" said Junior Eric Sitorus.

**BROOKLYN, NY** - The 34th Annual Rock and Roll Hall Of Fame Induction Ceremony took place March 29 at Barclays Center in Brooklyn, New York.

Nominated artists include The Cure, Def Leppard, Janet Jackson, Stevie Nicks, Radiohead, Roxy Music, and The Zombies. According to the hall of fame website, "Inductees are recognized for having contributed over 25 years of music excellence."

Radiohead was eligible to join in 2018, but was brushed off from the induction last year, critics say. This was quite alarming to fans, considering the band is one of the most recognized rock bands.

"The whole situation was pretty 'High and Dry,' but at least finally they're getting the eligibility and recognition they deserve," said a critic online.

The Zombies were somewhat of a surprise to younger generations, considering the fact that they're a band that blew up back in the sixties. Def Leppard, to most, was very expected as they were a premier hair band in the eighties, selling out the biggest arenas. Many people probably may not have expected the success of the alternative rock bands The Cure and Roxy Music to have joined in, since they're bands that some may not be familiar with.

The Cure was the proto Emo band and was eligible in 2004. This was the second time the band was nominated


